**PARENT INVOLVEMENT POLICIES AND PRACTICES
REQUIREMENTS AND HOW ACHIEVED**

1. **Requirement:** Involve parents in the joint development, review, and improvement of the Title I, Part A program plan.

How Achieved: Campus site-based improvement committee meetings; parent organization review; Goals Day parent volunteer solicitation.

2. **Requirement:** Provide parents of participating children timely information about Title I, Part A programs.

How Achieved: Monthly parent activities communicated via a parent activity calendar; grade level meetings with parents to discuss CIRCLE, TPRI, TEMI, STAAR, and other assessments; meetings with individual parents to discuss their children's academic progress and performance in the classroom and on assessments; Tuesday folders; parent newsletter; and Title I Annual Parent Meeting.

3. **Requirement:** Provide a description and explanation of the curriculum in use at the school, the forms of academic assessment used to measure students' progress and the proficiency levels students are expected to meet.

How Achieved: Website posting of curriculum documents and explanations; Title I Annual Parent Meeting; Meet the Teacher Night prior to the beginning of the school year to communicate program descriptions, curriculum descriptions, and academic as well as behavioral goals and expectations; and conferences are scheduled with parents of all elementary students.
